Mayor Richardson called the Council meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

Welcome and Roll Call

Pledge of Allegiance

Councilmember Whitten led the Council and audience in the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval of Agenda

COUNCILMEMBER MAIER MOVED AND MAYOR PRO TEM KENT SECONDED THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE AGENDA AS PUBLISHED. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

Presentations

1. United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission Presentation

Jason Brodlowicz, Resident Inspector at Energy Northwest, and Christopher Highley, Senior Resident Inspector for Region IV of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC), delivered a joint presentation on the NRC's mission, oversight responsibilities,

and operational framework at the Columbia Generating Station. Mr. Highley also presented the 2024 Assessment Summary for the Columbia Generating Station, which included updates on inspection activities, regulatory assessments, enforcement actions, and reported violations. He noted that a focused inspection of the plant's Safety Conscious Work Environment is scheduled for July 2025.

Tricia Vossmar, Chief of Branch A within the NRC's Region IV Division of Operating Reactor Safety, described her responsibilities for overseeing resident inspectors and ensuring impartial regulatory oversight at the Columbia Generating Station. She noted that the plant had previously been placed in column two of the NRC's action matrix due to two (2) radiation protection issues categorized as "white" findings, indicating low to moderate safety significance.

Following a comprehensive follow-up inspection, the NRC determined that corrective actions were satisfactory, and the plant was returned to column one, the highest performance category in April 2025. Ms. Vossmar emphasized the agency's use of a risk-informed approach in evaluating safety concerns and reiterated the NRC's role as an independent regulator, committed to nuclear safety rather than advocacy. She concluded by affirming that the plant is currently operating safely and acknowledged the critical role of resident inspectors Chris Highley and Jason Brodlowicz.

Public Hearing

City Clerk Rogers read the Public Hearing and Public Comments procedures.

3. Proposed Amendment to the 2025-2030 Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program for the Systemic Pedestrian Crossing Safety Improvements Project, Resolution No. 2025-71

Mayor Richardson opened the public hearing at 6:19 p.m. and closed the public hearing at 6:20 p.m. No testimony was offered.

4. Proposed General Obligation Bond Issuance to Finance Upgrades to the City's Municipal Solid Waste Facilities, Resolution No. 2025-72

Mayor Richardson described the need to hold a public hearing in connection with Resolution No. 2025-72. She read a prepared statement, explaining that the public hearing was being held to comply with Section 147(f)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, which requires a public hearing before issuing certain types of tax-exempt bonds. She stated that the Richland City Council was acting as the applicable elected body for the jurisdiction, and that notice of the hearing had been published on the City's website for no less than seven (7) days in advance of the hearing.

The hearing also relates to Ordinance 2025-12, authorizing issuance of 2025 limited tax general obligation bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$8,500,000 to fund upgrades to the City's municipal solid waste disposal facility located at the Horn Rapids Landfill. Mayor Richardson noted that written comments were invited via mail, email, or hand delivery at the meeting.

City Clerk Rogers confirmed that no written comments were received.

Mayor Richardson opened and closed the public hearing at 6:22 p.m. No testimony was offered.

Public Comments

Substantial public comment was received regarding a request for the mayor's signature on a "Call to Action" letter generated by Benton County regarding the protection and preservation of girls sports.

At the end of her time, Ms. Beard provided written comments for Council's consideration.

Randy Slovic, a Richland resident, questioned Council's process for revisiting failed decisions.

COUNCILMEMBER WHITTEN MOVED AND MAYOR PRO TEM KENT SECONDED THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE CONSENT AGENDA AS PUBLISHED. THOSE IN FAVOR: MAYOR RICHARDSON, MAYOR PRO TEM KENT, AND

Items of Business

22. Ordinance No. 2025-15, Authorizing a Concomitant Agreement in lieu of a Rezone affecting 9025 Center Parkway (Closed Record)

Mayor Richardson identified the items that comprise the record for the purpose of the closed-record review hearing. The items of record include all documents that were presented to the Richland Hearing Examiner and accepted into evidence at or prior to the open-record public hearing on August 12, 2024, an October 22, 2024 memorandum from the applicant, City staff's November 7, 2024 memorandum to the Hearing Examiner supporting the applicant's October 22, 2024 updated proposal, and the Hearing Examiner's February 13, 2025 written report and recommendations. All ordinances and comprehensive plans adopted by the City and applicable to the project are also of record.

City Attorney Kintzley provided an overview of the closed record review hearing process and asked if any councilmembers had any potential conflicts of interest to disclose. No conflicts were disclosed. City Attorney Kintzley then asked the audience if anyone had any objection to any councilmember's participation in the closed-record review hearing. No objections were raised. Finally, City Attorney Kintzley asked if anyone present had any objections based on jurisdictional grounds as required by the Richland Municipal Code. No objections were raised.

City Clerk Rogers read the closed record review hearing procedures.

Mayor Richardson opened the public hearing at 7:32 p.m.

Planning Manager Stevens presented details on the proposed concomitant agreement for four (4) lots located at the intersection of Center Parkway and Steptoe Street in south Richland. He explained that development on the site has been challenging due to existing setback requirements under Neighborhood Retail Business (C-1) zoning. The applicant initially sought a rezone from C-1 to Retail Business (C-2) to take advantage of less restrictive setbacks. However, in response to concerns about commercial development near residential areas, the applicant and staff explored alternative solutions.

The Richland Hearing Examiner, after the open-record public hearing, recommended that City Council had the authority to enter into an agreement that would allow for site-specific setback alterations in lieu of a rezone to C-2 zoning. The parties, developer and city staff, worked together to provide a proposed concomitant agreement that would bind the property owner to specific setbacks favorable to neighboring residential development while maintaining C-1 zoning. Planning Manager Stevens concluded by adding the proposal was in the City's best interest, as it would shift development closer to the commercial frontage and away from adjacent residences.

Mayor Richardson invited the applicant to offer comments. Rick Simon, consultant representing property owner Tim Bush, expressed support for Ordinance No. 2025-15, stating it provided a feasible development solution for the constrained parcels while preserving neighborhood buffers.

No other testimony was offered. Mayor Richardson closed the hearing at 7:44 p.m.

COUNCILMEMBER JONES MOVED AND COUNCILMEMBER WHITTEN SECONDED THE MOTION TO APPROVE ORDINANCE NO. 2025-15, AUTHORIZING A CONCOMITANT AGREEMENT IN LIEU OF A REZONE AFFECTING 9025 CENTER PARKWAY. THOSE IN FAVOR: MAYOR RICHARDSON, MAYOR PRO TEM KENT, AND COUNCILMEMBERS JONES, LUKSON, MAIER, VANDYKE, AND WHITTEN. THOSE OPPOSED: NONE. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

23. Resolution No. 2025-48, Authorizing a First Amendment to the Facility Use Agreement with American Cruise Lines, Inc.

Parks & Public Facilities Director Waite presented Resolution No. 2025-48, which proposes to amend the existing facility use agreement with American Cruise Lines, Inc., to increase the number of optional five (5) year extensions from two (2) to four (4), subject to updated insurance requirements and a built-in rent escalator.

Detailed information can be found in the PowerPoint presentation included in the agenda packet. Following the presentation, Council engaged in a question-and-answer session with staff.

MAYOR PRO TEM KENT MOVED AND COUNCILMEMBER JONES SECONDED THE MOTION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 2025-48, AUTHORIZING A FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE FACILITY USE AGREEMENT WITH AMERICAN CRUISE LINES, INC. THOSE IN FAVOR: MAYOR RICHARDSON, MAYOR PRO TEM KENT, AND COUNCILMEMBERS JONES, LUKSON, MAIER, VANDYKE AND WHITTEN. THOSE OPPOSED: NONE. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

24. Resolution No. 2025-71, Amending the 2025-2030 Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program for the Systemic Pedestrian Crossing Safety Improvements Project

Public Works Director D'Alessandro presented Resolution No. 2025-71, which proposes an amendment to the City's 2025-2030 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to reinstate the Systemic Pedestrian Crossing Safety Improvement Project. He explained that the City originally received funding for this project in 2022 through the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) City Safety Program. The project was added to the TIP in 2023 and carried into 2024, with construction expected the same year. However, since construction did not occur as scheduled, the project was omitted from the 2025 TIP.

To proceed with the project and obligate the previously awarded funds, the City must amend the 2025-2030 TIP to re-add the project.

Public Works Director D'Alessandro explained that the Systemic Pedestrian Crossing Safety Improvement Project includes various improvements such as rectangular rapid flashing beacons, signage, pavement markings, median refuge islands, and ADA curb ramps. These improvements are planned for multiple intersections. Funding for the project is already secured, and this amendment is purely administrative to satisfy WSDOT's requirements.

COUNCILMEMBER VANDYKE MOVED AND COUNCILMEMBER WHITTEN SECONDED THE MOTION TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2025-71, AMENDING THE 2025-2030 SIX-YEAR TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR THE SYSTEMIC PEDESTRIAN CROSSING SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT. THOSE IN FAVOR: MAYOR RICHARDSON, MAYOR PRO TEM KENT, AND COUNCILMEMBERS JONES, LUKSON, MAIER, VANDYKE AND WHITTEN. THOSE OPPOSED: NONE. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

25. Resolution No. 2025-72, Proposed General Obligation Bond Issuance to Finance Upgrades to the City's Municipal Solid Waste Facilities

Finance Director Allen presented Resolution No. 2025-72, explaining that the item pertains to the issuance of 2025 Limited Tax General Obligation Bonds to finance upgrades to the City's solid waste facilities at the Horn Rapids Landfill, a project previously included in the City's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Finance Director Allen clarified that Resolution No. 2025-72 involves a Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA) hearing, an IRS requirement when issuing private activity bonds that are intended to be treated as tax-exempt.

He also noted that while cities typically issue tax-exempt bonds for public projects, the City's existing agreement with the landfill's gas off-taker prevents the use of traditional tax-exempt financing. The TEFRA process, governed by IRS rules, permits these bonds to retain tax-exempt status despite private involvement, thereby enabling the City to secure more favorable interest rates. Finance Director Allen concluded by stating the bond issuance is anticipated to occur in late June 2025.

COUNCILMEMBER WHITTEN MOVED AND COUNCILMEMBER LUKSON SECONDED THE MOTION TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2025-72, AUTHORIZING GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND ISSUANCE TO FINANCE UPGRADES TO THE CITY'S MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE FACILITIES. THOSE IN FAVOR: MAYOR RICHARDSON, MAYOR PRO TEM KENT, AND COUNCILMEMBERS JONES, LUKSON, MAIER, VANDYKE AND WHITTEN. THOSE OPPOSED: NONE. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

26. Potential Council Correspondence

City Manager Amundson provided procedural guidance to Council regarding how to proceed with the correspondence items on the agenda. The first letter addressed involved a letter of support regarding the protection and preservation of girls sports.

COUNCILMEMBER WHITTEN MOVED AND COUNCILMEMBER VANDYKE SECONDED THE MOTION AUTHORIZING MAYOR RICHARDSON TO SIGN THE GIRLS SPORTS LETTER ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF RICHLAND.

Councilmembers engaged in an in-depth discussion regarding the *Girls Sports* letter, which advocates for the separation of biological males and females in organized sports. Councilmembers expressed a wide range of perspectives throughout the deliberation.

Some councilmembers supported the letter, emphasizing the importance of preserving fairness and safety in girls' athletics. They cited public opinion polls and shared concerns raised by constituents and school officials. Other councilmembers opposed the letter, questioning its relevance to municipal governance, the lack of related local incidents, and whether it was appropriate for City Council to weigh in on state or national issues.

Several councilmembers noted that matters of athletic eligibility fall under the purview of organizations such as the Washington Interscholastic Activities Association (WIAA) and not the Richland City Council.

After discussion concluded, Mayor Richardson called for a vote.

THOSE IN FAVOR: MAYOR RICHARDSON AND COUNCILMEMBERS JONES, VANDYKE AND WHITTEN. THOSE OPPOSED: MAYOR PRO TEM KENT AND COUNCILMEMBERS LUKSON AND MAIER. MOTION CARRIED 4-3.

The next letter addressed concerned a letter in support of Theodore Garrish's nomination to serve as the Department of Energy's assistant secretary for nuclear energy.

Councilmember Maier voiced support for signing the letter, stating that it pertains directly to city business and the city's future relationship with the energy industry. He viewed it as an appropriate example of correspondence in which the Richland City Council has a legitimate interest.

Mayor Pro Tem Kent also supported signing the letter, emphasizing the importance of securing effective representation for the City of Richland in matters related to the Department of Energy and federal activities in Washington, D.C. She concluded by saying Mr. Garrish is well-qualified to represent both Richland and the broader southeastern Washington region.

COUNCILMEMBER WHITTEN MOVED AND COUNCILMEMBER VANDYKE SECONDED THE MOTION AUTHORIZING MAYOR RICHARDSON TO SIGN THE LETTER SUPPORTING THE APPOINTMENT OF THEODORE (TED) GARRISH TO SERVE AS THE DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY'S ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR

NUCLEAR ENERGY. THOSE IN FAVOR: MAYOR RICHARDSON, MAYOR PRO TEM KENT, AND COUNCILMEMBERS JONES, LUKSON, MAIER, VANDYKE AND WHITTEN. THOSE OPPOSED: NONE. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

Reports and Comments

City Manager

City Manager Amundson shared several upcoming events with Council. In recognition of National Public Works Week (May 18-24), the Public Works Department will offer guided tours of the City's water and wastewater treatment plants for councilmembers. The tours will provide a behind-the-scenes look at the essential infrastructure that supports daily operations. Additional information and registration details will be sent from the City Manager's Office via email.

Next, he announced that Hanford Communities will host a community discussion on May 14, 2025 from 5:30 - 7:30 p.m. at the Tri-Cities Visitor Center in Kennewick. The event, titled *"What is Hanford Cleanup and Why Does It Matter Today?"* will feature speakers from the Department of Ecology, Department of Energy, and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), who will provide updates on current and future cleanup efforts. Councilmembers interested in attending were encouraged to contact the City Manager's Office to initiate the registration process.

Lastly, City Manager Amundson invited councilmembers and the public to attend the grand opening and ribbon-cutting ceremony for the newly renovated Howard Amon Park playground on May 16, 2025 at 11:00 a.m. City Manager Amundson noted that the improvements include a new shade structure that was funded in part by a donation from long-time resident Robert (Bob) Zinsli.

City Council

Councilmember Lukson expressed concerns about the City Council engaging in politically charged topics that fall outside its jurisdiction, and urged Council to focus on its core responsibilities as outlined in the City's Strategic Plan and legislative priorities.

Councilmember Maier concurred with Councilmember Lukson's comments and added that Council's decision to support signing of the *Girls Sports* letter did not result in any substantive outcome.

He then highlighted findings from the recent community survey which showed a significant increase in the percentage of Richland residents utilizing public transit. He stated that he will present the data at an upcoming Ben Franklin Transit Board meeting. Lastly, Councilmember Maier suggested that Council consider eliminating street-side setbacks in areas where sidewalks and utility easements already exist, as they do not protect neighboring properties and lead to inefficient land use and development.

Councilmember Whitten acknowledged Councilmember Lukson's concerns about the potential politicization of City Council actions and agreed that the Council should remain focused on matters within its jurisdiction. However, he disagreed with the assertion that the *Girls Sports* letter was entirely partisan, referencing national polling data which indicates bipartisan support for similar positions. He emphasized the importance of maintaining a focused and consistent approach to reviewing future letters of support and suggested that correspondence be limited to issues directly related to City priorities or within the Council's influence.

In conclusion, Councilmember Whitten echoed Councilmember Maier's comments regarding easements and land use and expressed support for the approval of the concomitant agreement approved in Ordinance No. 2025-15. He stated that the approval represents a positive step toward implementing more favorable policies that will enable productive land use.

Councilmember Jones expressed support for implementing a city policy to screen all letters requesting Council endorsement. She emphasized that advocacy efforts should align with the City's responsibilities and reiterated the need for a clear policy to prevent similar situations from occurring in the future.

Councilmember VanDyke thanked representatives from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for their presentation and for ensuring community safety. He then reported on recent community engagement events, which included the groundbreaking ceremony for the Richland Public Library's All-Ages Outdoor Space and the Regional Advocacy Roundtable: Business & Law Enforcement Partnership on Crime Prevention, hosted by the Tri-City Regional Chamber of Commerce. Lastly, Councilmember VanDyke commended staff for assisting a resident who experienced a vehicle breakdown in the City Hall parking lot.

Mayor Pro Tem Kent expressed appreciation to the City and the Richland Fire Department for their continued commitment to public safety. She acknowledged the efforts of Richland firefighters who are pursuing paramedic certifications to better respond to the growing number of health-related emergency calls. She then reported attending the groundbreaking ceremony for the Richland Public Library's All-Ages Outdoor Space earlier in the day with Councilmember VanDyke and Mayor Richardson. She also encouraged citizens to attend the Howard Amon Playground ribbon-cutting and grand opening on May 16, 2025 at 11:00 a.m. at Howard Amon Park.

Mayor Pro Tem Kent went on to reflect on the diverse perspectives represented on the Council which demonstrates Council's varied backgrounds and shared commitment to representing the community. She then voiced support for the development of a formal policy for reviewing and approving letters requesting the mayor's signature. She emphasized the importance of transparency and public input, especially when such correspondence generates significant community interest. She suggested that sponsors of future letters be prepared to address questions if the topic is placed on the agenda for Council consideration.

Finally, Mayor Pro Tem Kent concluded by thanking the Nuclear Regulatory Commission representatives for their continued presence throughout the lengthy meeting.

Mayor

Mayor Richardson shared her experience participating in a staff-led initiative called *Richland Cares*, which involved litter clean-up along State Route 240. She described the event as a valuable opportunity to connect with city staff. She encouraged fellow councilmembers to participate in future *Richland Cares* events as a way to engage with staff and contribute to the community.
